

POLICY CONTEXT

What are the IHR?

- The International Health Regulations (IHR) represent an agreement between 196 countries, including all WHO Member States, to work together for global health security.
- Under the IHR, all countries must report events of international public health importance.
- We share a responsibility to protect our world from outbreaks of **infectious diseases and other health threats**.
- The goal of the IHR is to stop events in their tracks before they become international emergencies
- **Food Safety Incidents, Emergencies and Food Borne Illness & Outbreaks** constitutes or forms part of such events that must be looked at in order to avoid a Public Health Emergency of International Threat.





HOW DO WE NEED TO LOOK AT IT- I.E. BE PREPARED

Food Safety Incidents, Emergencies, and Food Borne Illness & Outbreaks constitutes or forms part of the **events** that must be looked at in order to to avoid a Public Health Emergency of International Threat under the IHR, 2005

Prevent – Detect - Respond - Report





SOME DEFINITIONS

- **Public Health Emergency of International Concern (PHEIC)** An extraordinary event which is determined to: 1) constitute a public health risk to other States through the international spread of disease; and 2) potentially requires a coordinated international response public health risk.
- **Public health risk** The likelihood that an event may adversely affect the health of human populations, with an emphasis in the IHR on events that may spread internationally or may present a serious and direct danger.
- <u>Event</u> Manifestation of disease or an occurrence that creates a potential for disease as a result of events including, but not limited to, those that are of infectious, zoonotic, food safety, chemical, radiological or nuclear in origin or source.
- <u>Food safety incident</u> Unintentional Act with Unintentional Harm Poses a Public Health Threat as product is in distribution (may or may not be in trade or at

SOME DEFINITIONS

<u>Food safety alert</u> - Government Notification to Industry/Competent Authority about a food safety incident/emergency/recall/withdrawal

<u>**Risk</u>** - Situation in which there is a probability that the use of, or exposure to an agent or contaminated product will cause adverse health consequences or death.</u>

<u>**Risk assessment</u>** - Qualitative or quantitative estimation of the likelihood of adverse effects that may result from exposure to specified health hazards or the absence of beneficial influences.</u>

<u>Recall</u> – Industry action to take product off shelf or from Consumers

<u>Withdrawal</u> - Government action to take unsafe product off shelf/ out of distribution.

<u>Horizon scanning</u> - The systematic examination of potential hazards, opportunities and likely future developments which are at the margins of current thinking and planning







SOME DEFINITIONS

NOTIFICATION - Official communication of a disease/health event to the WHO by the health administration of the Member State affected by the disease/health event or national notification of an event to the national surveillance system, occurring at the country level, and not subject to notification to WHO.

OUTBREAK SCIENCE - Recent progress in the detection and response to outbreaks of infectious diseases.

FOODBORNE ILLNESS/OUTBREAK – The occurrence of more cases of a disease than that which is normally expected, within a specific place or group of people, over a given period of time;





WHO IS RESPONSIBLE FOR WHAT?

FOOD SAFETY LEGISLATION – FOOD CONTROL

- Foodstuffs Cosmetics and Disinfectants Act, (Act 54 of 1972)
- Section 2 relates to Safety and places the onus on the Manufacturer/Seller/Importer/Exporter to ensure that a foodstuff is Safe irrespective of a Regulation being in place.
- Approximately **50 sets of Regulations**
- Regulations Governing General Hygiene Requirements for Food Premises and the Transport of Food (R.638 of 22 June 2018)
 - Regulation 10(18) traceability system recall plan/procedure report to the local inspector and the National Directorate: Food Control.
- Labelling Regulations, R146/2010 Supplier Ingredient File







WHO IS RESPONSIBLE FOR WHAT?


- FOOD SAFETY EMERGENCIES/ INCIDENTS/ EVENTS/ RECALLS/ FOOD SAFETY ALERTS -FOOD CONTROL
 - > International EU Rapid Alert System for Food and Feed (RASFF) Contact Point
 - International INFOSAN Emergency Contact Point
 - Local Food Safety Alert Contact Point (R638/2018 reporting)
- FOOD BORNE ILLNESS/OUTBREAKS NICD/CDC/EH/Surveillance
- INDUSTRY VOLUNTARY NOTIFIED OR RECALL AS A RESULT OF CONSUMER COMPLAINT OR AT THE REQUEST OF A COMPETENT AUTHORITY (SECTION 60) – National Consumer Commission (NCC)
- **INDUSTRY:** Notification/Recall
- **COMPETENT AUTHORITY:** Inform (Notification) and/or Withdraw








HOW IS THE FOOD SAFETY ALERT SYSTEM INFORMED / ACTIVATED



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Examples of Food Safety Alerts


